

# Summary Report on Result of Citizen's Score Card on Elected Officials to Response to the Priority Needs at Remote or Indigenous Communes



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#### I. Indroduction

With finance support from EU, Comfrel conducted a workshop on voter's voice to set the priority needs in a hundred communes in 16 different provinces during 2010-2012.

The objective of the workshop was to empower voters and to demonstrate their rights and duties to participate effectively in local democracy. This also included giving voter's the opportunity to participate in discussions to set the local agenda or priority needs in their commune, with the results of the workshop to be accepted by elected official for the commune development plan CDP or political platfom for the next election.

After the workshop, Comfrel conducted an evaluation of the fullfilment of elected officials response to the priority needs raised by voters. This evaluation wasorganized in order for citizens to participate in the monitoring and evaluation of the fullfillment of elected officials response to priority needs of voters, particularly the priority needs raised in workshop on voter's vioce to set the local agenda in remote or indigenous communes. On the other hand Comfrel will dessiminate and provide the report of this evaluation to political parties, NGOs, and relevant institutes.

#### II. Method of evaluation

The Citizen's Score Card (CSC) was used to evaluate the fullfilment of elected officials response to the priority needs of voters in remote and indigenous communes through interviewing voters who participated in the workshop on voter's vioce to set local agenda in their remote or indigenous commune..

Short Message Services (SMS) is used for sending the data collected from field to Comfrel through volunteers.

100 workshops on voter's voice to set local agenda or priority needs were conducted in 2010-2012. Each commune workshops voters discussed and developed 5 main local agenda or priority needs for elected officials to consider for their communed evelopment plan and political platfom for the next election. In total, there were 21 priority needs developed and coded to make it easier for interviewing and sending the results through SMS as below:

#### III. Result

In late 2012, to promote voter's participation and enhance accountability of elected officials, especially voters in remote and indigenous communes in governance democracy, Comfrel sent back the priority needs raised in the workshop on voter's vioce to set the local agenda or in 2010-2012 through volunteer activits in order to score the fulfillment of the priority needs by elected official.

15 voters in each commune who participated in the workshop were selected to score the response of elected officials in relation to the priority needs raised by voters as below:

1 = (0-20%) for not responded at all

2= (21-40%) for moderately responded

3= (41-60%) for average responded

## Result of Voter Scoring of the elected offical's performance of priority needs for remote and indigenous communes

After conducting the workshop on voter's voice to set the local agenda/ priority needs in remote and indigenous communes, there were 21 different priorities needs identified and coded in order to make it easier to conduct the evaluation process and send the results through SMS. Below are the priority codes and there meaning along with the number of communes which raised the local agenda items.



In what degree did local elected official respond to the priority needs raised by villagers in the workshop on voter's voice to set the local agenda or priority needs in your commune?

Priority Code1: Build commune health center and post, provide nurse, midwife and doctor, provide ambulance and three wheel motorcycle (Remork) for transporting sick people to the hospital, provide a well, and provide rural credit.


Out of 708 respondents from 55 remote and indigenous communes, 416, equal to 58.76% evaluated that the political representative at local level commune councils had not responded to the at all above priority needs raised. 137, equal to 19.35% replied that they responded moderately; 105, equal to 14.83% scored the response as average; 46,



equal to 6.50% affirmed that they largely responded; 4, equal to 0.50% evaluated that local elected officials almost or completely responded.

## <u>Priority Code2</u>: Build new roads and conduct maintainance, build new bridge (bridge and drainage)


Out of 853 respondents from 64 remote and indigenous communes, 337, equal to 39.5% evaluated that local elected official had not at all responded to the above priority needs. 245, equal to 28.7% said they responded moderately; 159, equal to 18.6% scored the response as average; 99, equal to 11.6% affirmed that reponse had largely occured;



and 13, equal to 1.5% evaluated the response by local elected officials as almost or completed.

<u>Priority code3:</u> Provide Kubota's power tiller for agriculture works, provide agricultural technical training course for growing rice, and provide rice seeds and agriculture materials.


Out of 99 respondents from 10 remote and indigenous communes, 33 equal to 33.3% scored the response of political representatives at local level to have not at all responded to the priority needs raised in the workshop on voter's voice.; 20, equal to 20.2% evaluated that they had responded moderately; 21 equal to 21.2% scored the response



as average and largely satisfactory; and only 4, equal to 4.0% evaluated the response to be almost near or completed.

# Priority Code4: Build school and provide a teacher, build the village meeting hall, build temple and monastery eating hall


Out of 569 respondents 43 remote and from indigenous communes, 275 respondents equal to 48.3% evaluated that the elected official at local level had not at all responded to the above mentioned priority needs.; 136 equal to 23.9% assessed that the response was moderate; 72, equal to 13.4% said that response was average; 49, equal to



9.7% said that they had responded largely; and 27, equal to 4.7% scored the response as almost or completely.


## Priority Code5: Form rattan manufacturing group and training in handicraft skills

Out of 6 respondents from a remote or indigenous commune, 5 equal to 83.3% evaluated that commune councils or representative of political party at local level had not at all responded to the priority needs of villagers in relation to the above priorities and only 1 equal to 16.7% assessed that they moderately responded.



# Priority Code6: Build pumps station, dig and repair canal and water gate, pond, dam and drainage


Out of 430 respondents from 34 remote indigenous communes, 244 equal to 56.7% evaluated that commune councils representative of political parties at local level had not at all to respond to their priority needs identified above. 103, equal to 24.0% evaluated the responded as moderate; 59, equal to 13.7%



assessed that response as average; 15, equal to 3.5% said that they had largely responded; and 9, equal to 2.1% affirmed that they almost or completely responded.

# <u>Priority Code7</u>: Educate about health and sanitation, build toilets, and provide water filter tank and pumping well


Out of 495 respondents from 36 remote and indigenous communes, 270 equal to 54.5% evaluated that commune councils orthe representative of political party had not at all all responded to the above identified priority needs. 129, equal to 26.1% reported that they moderately responded; 62, equal to 12.5% assessed that average they



responded; 30, equal to 6.1% said they largely responded; and only 4, equal to 0.8% affirmed the response was almost.

## <u>Priority Code8</u>: Connect their commune to the electrical grid and ask for generator


Out of 103 respondents from 11 remote and indigenous communes, 61 equal to 59.2% evaluated that commune councils or the representative political party had not all to responded to the priority needs raised by villagers as mentioned above. 12, equal to 11.7% responded that they moderately responded; 24, equal to 23.3% assessed



that response was average r; and 6, equal to 5.8% said that they almost or completely responded.

<u>Priority Code9</u>: Provide technical training for animal feeding and provide annual vaccines for animals.


Out of 86 respondents from remote orindigenous communes, 28 equal to 32.6% evaluated that commune councils or the representative of political party had not at all to respond to the priority needs raised by villagers in the workshop as stated above. 30, equal to 34.9% reported they moderately responded; 19, equal to 22.1% assessed the response was average,; 8,



equal to 9.3% said they largely responded; and only 1, equal to 1.2% affirmed that they almost or completely responded.

# <u>Priority Code10</u>: Solve or reconcile land dispute (land concession) and give land forest to community


Out of 207 respondents from 20 remote indigenous communes, 120 equal to 58.0% evaluated that commune councils or the representative of political party had not at responded to the priority above.; needs stated equal to 20.8% assessed response was moderate; 33, equal to 15.9% evaluated thee response as average; 9,



equal to 4.3% said they largely responded; and only 2, equal to 1.0% scored the response as almost.

<u>Priority Code11</u>: Create a fishery and forestry community and prevent Prey Chboss (Type of tree that villager extract resin from)


Out of 56 respondents from 6 remote orindigenous communes, 9 equal to 16.1% evaluated that commune councils or representative the political party had not at all responded to the above priority needs raised by villagers as mentioned above; 26, equal to 50.0% stated that they moderately responded; 17, equal to 30.4% said the response



was average; and only 1, equal to 1.8% evaluated that they had largely and completely responded.

# Priority Code12: Accelerate the process of citizen's ID and prohibit local authority from the overcharge of fees for making ID card


Out of 91 respondents remote from indigenous communes, 11 equal to 21.1% evaluated that commune councils or the representative political parties at local level do had not at all responded to the priority needs raised by villagers in relation to the above.. 27, equal to 29.7% stated that they moderately responded;



39, equal to 42.9% assessed the response to be average; 11, equal to 12.1% said they largely responded; and only 3, equal to 3.3% said they had responded completely.

# Priority Code13: Reduce the price of goods consumption such as gasoline, diesel and fertilizer


Out of 55 respondents from 4 remote and indigenous communes, 23, equal to 41.8% evaluated that commune councils or the representative of political party at local level had not at all responded to the villager's priority needs raised in workshop on voter's voice as stated above. 19, equal to 34.5% stated they responded moderately; only 1,



equal to 1.8% said the response was average; and 12, equal to 21.8% assessed that they had largely responded.

<u>Priority Code14</u>: Enforce the implementation of village commune safety policy and maintain security and public order such as in response to gangsters, gambling and drug...etc.


Out of 83 respondents from 7 remote and indigenous communes, 5 equal to 6.0% commune evaluated that councils or representative of political party at local level had not at all responded to the above priority needs raised by villagers.; 33, equal 39.8% assessed the response as average; 12. equal to 14.5% said they had largely responded; and only



1, equal to 1.2% said they had completely responded.

## <u>Priority Code15</u>: Stop illegal fishing, flooded deforestation, and preserve natural resources


Out of 124 respondents from 10 remote and indigenous communes, 8, equal to 6.5% that commune evaluated councils or representative of political parties at local level had not at all responded to the priority needs mentioned above. 41, equal to 33.1% said that they had moderately responded; 40, equal to 34.7% assessed that the response was average; and the same 16,



equal to 12.9% scored that the response as largely, and almost or completely.


## Priority Code16: Develop new market for agricultural products such as rice, bean, corn and cassava

Out of 11 respondents from 1 remote commune, 54.5% 6. equal to evaluated that commune councils or representative of the political party at local level has not at all responded to the priority needs raised by villagers mentioned above. others, equal to 45.5% the scored responses made had been average.



Priority Code17: Provide training courses and disseminate education on domestic violence, traffic law, land law and protecting indigenous people's culture


Out of 121 respondents from 10 remote indigenous communes, equal to 38.0% evaluated that commune councils or representative the of political party at local level had not responded at all to the above priority needs raised by villagers. 32, equal to 26.4% said that they had moderately responded; 25, equal to 20.7% assessed that



the response was average; 10, equal to 8.3% said they had largely responded; and 8, equal to 6.6% indicated that they had completely responded.


## Priority Code18: Build crematorium and station for fish breeding

Of 15 respondents from 1 remote commune, all of them said that commune councils or representative of political party at local had not level responded to the priority needs raised by villagers to build crematorium build station for fish breeding.




#### Priority Code19: Build commune office and commune administration police post

Of 6 respondents from a remote commune, all of them said that commune councils or representative of political party at local level were yet to respond at all to the priority needs raised villagers build by to office commune and administration commune police post.



## <u>Priority Code20</u>: Ask for reconciliation for villagers effected with hydro-electric dam construction


Of 15 respondents from a remote commune, almost all of them with 14, equal to 93.3% said that commune councils or representative of political party at local level had not at all responded to the their priority needs raised by the villagers to reconcile villagers effected with hydro-



electric dam construction; and only 1, equal to 6.7% indicated that they had moderately responded.

## Priority Code21: Provide scholarship for poor students and job opportunity

Of 10 respondents from a remote commune, most of them evaluated that commune councils or representative of political party at local level had not at all responded to the priority needs raised by the villagers to provide scholarship for poor students and job opportunity.
